About a year ago, we sat down and took inventory of what made the WI a success and where it needed some strength. Producing an at-a-glance document to help clarify the various roles within the WI from National, State and Chapter level would assist current and new leaders in their recruitment and leadership skills. Looking back, we have discussed the roles of WI leadership and feel that many states have made great progress. Within TU, there are only seven states that are without a WI State Coordinator. Our goal to see increased women in leadership roles has gained consistent momentum over the past few years. Communication has been key in this effort. Social media outlets such as the Women in TU Facebook group along with the usage of hashtags #womenoftroutunlimited, #troutunlimitedwomen, #womenflyfish have increased our web presence and encourage other women to share their adventures and conservation efforts. Strategic Alliance

STRATEGIC ALLIANCE is powerful form of ENGAGEMENT. It fosters RETEN-TION. It works all the WELCOME and GREETING muscles. Beyond simple partnership, STRATEGIC ALLIANCE, often with additional partnership bridges, can have two organizations working/engaged separately with a focal population to each party's respective benefit. Consider what kinds of diversity—different thinking, experience, knowledge, skills — would provide your Chapter or Council with the kinds of different solutions problems, be more adaptive or resilient when faced with forces of change. How can your organization add diversity rapidly, change its pool of knowledge, talent, different thinking in an instant? STRATEGIC ALLIANCE is a good place to look.

mandated to address issues of nutrition, personal health, and mental wellbeing. TU knows the tangible outcomes of connecting youth with nature, with conservation, with angling. Wouldn't TU's outcomes meet the needs of a Boys & Girls Club? Make the connection to the population first, deliver on the Strategic Alliance, and membership and mutually beneficial partnership will flow. Your Chapter or Council doesn't have to acquire all the expertise and service supports that working with youth might require. Strategic Alliance with an organization whose mission or day-to-day operation deploys a team of trained and certified counselors, or alliance with a funder who works with both organizations, is typically much faster than trying to develop all the expertise required to know everything. Strategic Alliances allow folks needing complementary pieces to make those connections, it can nearly instantly thrust you into a very diverse place, with lots of mutual learning.

What are the niche of need for other organizations in your the community? Can TU fill or help bridge a gap? Is there a Garden Club, Community Garden, Historic Preservation Society, Yo-

ga group—anywhere other women gather, and provide your organization the opportunity to work with, to be introduced by doing something with such a strategic ally?

TU mission is critical to protecting resources necessary for life on our Plant - water, earth, air, and energy. TU can advance its Women's Initiative by working with groups outside our own;



TU does not have to understand all languages spoken or have all the answers in-house so long as we ally ours with partners that know how.
